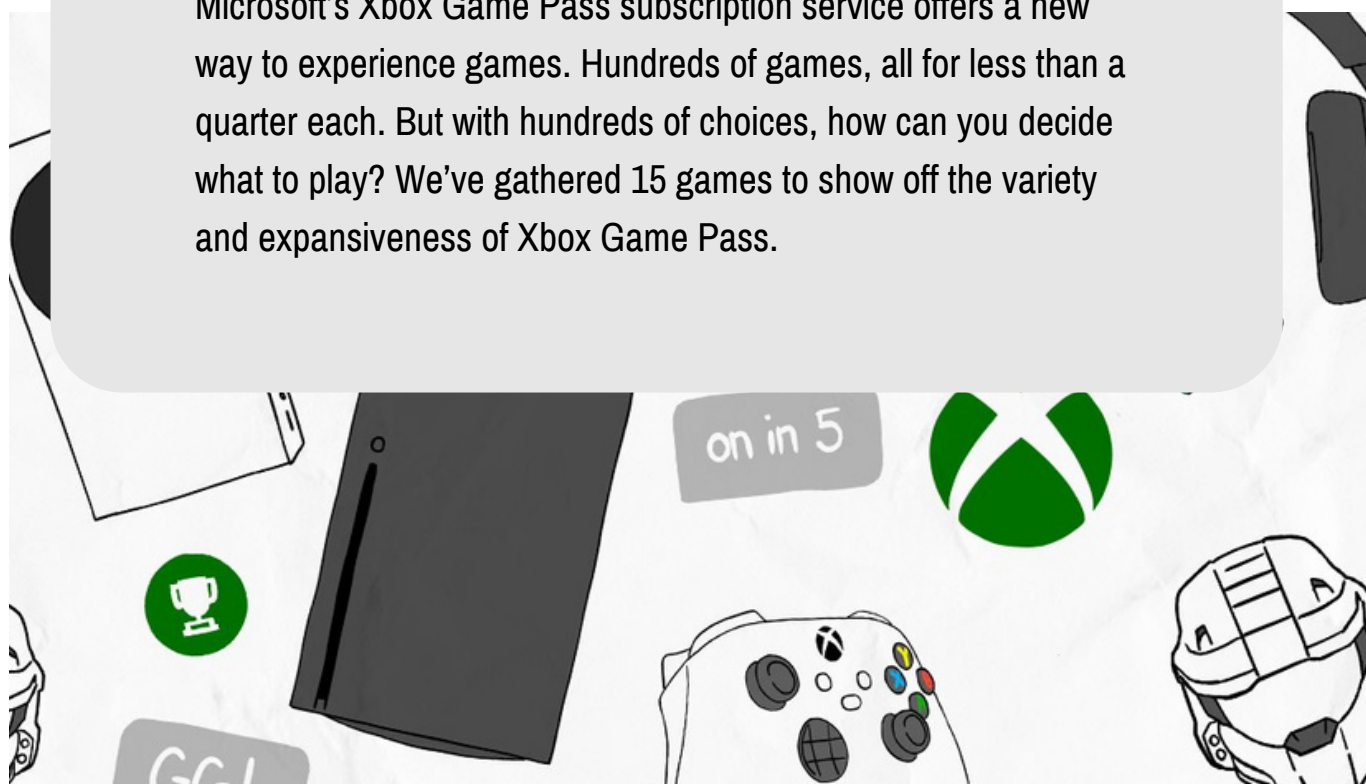

Designed for casual players seeking a light and accessible experience, these games welcome newcomers to Xbox Game Pass.

Escape Academy (Cloud, Console, PC)

Halo Infinite (Cloud, Console, PC)

The Halo franchise has defined Xbox since the very beginning. The newest entry thrusts you back into the shoes of Master Chief, a supersoldier, and

humanity's savior. Infinite is the first time the iconic first person shooter has gone open world for its campaign. Halo has always asked you to improvise your way across the battlefield, picking up different weapons and piloting different vehicles on your way to victory. Now though, you're improvising your way across a vast, hostile, open world. And as for the multiplayer, it continues to be the polished, hardcore shooter experience Halo fans have come to know and love. While Xbox's stable of exclusives continues to grow, Halo will always remain one of the brightest spots in Xbox's vast library, and is a highlight of Xbox Game Pass.

State of Decay 2 (Cloud, Console, PC)

State of Decay 2 offers gamers something a lot of zombie games don't: the full zombie apocalypse fantasy with no real compromises. From establishing a base, going on supply runs for everything from food to fuel to ammo, to crafting a cure for a dangerous blood plague that can zombify any of your community, the game thrusts you into a zombie apocalypse experience in a way other games don't. Playing as every member of your community with the fear of permadeath, the game teaches you caution pretty quickly. Between managing resources, finding new survivors for your community, handling the growing zombie threat, and managing relations with other communities, hours can pass as you conquer a world that has been claimed by the dead.

Starfield (Cloud, Console, PC)

Bethesda has always been known for crafting expansive RPG worlds. Whether it's the fantasy world of The Elder Scrolls series or the post-apocalyptic wasteland of the Fallout games, their games have always felt grander than most. With Starfield, the acclaimed studio has set its sights on space. With an aesthetic they've appropriately dubbed NASA-Punk, the game offers a future that almost seems like where our real world space exploration might lead, with its bulky space suits and barren alien landscapes. It offers all of this in a Bethesda style package, meaning plenty of colorful characters to meet, areas to explore, and enemies to fight. If you ever wanted to get lost in a universe not that different from our own, Starfield is perfect for you.

Remnant 2 (Cloud, Console, PC)

Dark Souls with guns. That phrase probably made a few people skip this entry, and that's fair. Soulslikes are not for the faint of heart, and Remnant 2 definitely continues that tradition. The game ditches Dark Souls style level design for endless, procedurally generated levels, to great effect. You traverse these levels alone or with up to 2 other players in co-op, shooting your way through a post-apocalyptic world overtaken by The Root, a race of evil trees threatening the entire multiverse. With plenty of loot and secrets to find, the game is a challenging but rewarding take on a familiar genre that any gamer could lose themselves in.

Dead Space (Cloud, Console, PC)

The original Dead Space trilogy set a new bar for horror games. Set on a space station where an alien virus has transformed the crew into terrifying necromorphs, creatures that require a lot more than a headshot to take down, you're thrust into the shoes of Isaac Clarke, an engineer fighting for survival against overwhelming odds. The remake by Motive Studio offers a new generation the chance to play a reimagined version of the horror classic. With the original campaign updated for modern sensibilities, the game offers a horror action game that feels both nostalgic and modern. For horror fans who are tired of walking simulators, the Dead Space remake offers the perfect blend of horror and action.

Secret Level

These are games that challenge the notion of what a game is. They twist genres, or even create new ones. Long time gamers who want unique experiences and non-gamers who haven't found anything mainstream to pull them into the hobby will find something to love here. These are some of the most unique experiences in gaming.

Slay the Spire (Cloud, Console, PC)

Blending roguelikes and trading card games, Slay the Spire created an entire genre: deckbuilders. Using a deck you build one card at a time to conquer a tower full of enemies, you engage in turn-based combat as one of a handful of classes, all adding their own twists to the challenging but fair battles. As you progress, you build your deck slowly but surely into something formidable. But like all roguelikes, if you die, you're thrown back to the beginning to start your journey (and deck) over. For people who like games with deep strategy, Slay The Spire is a breath of fresh air that offers a new sort of experience that easily deserves its spot in Game Pass's massive library.

Wreckfest (Cloud, Console, PC)

If the best part of racing games for you is wrecking other cars, Wreckfest is the game for you. While there are plenty of opportunities to race like more traditional racing games, wrecking other cars and causing damage tends to be the goal. With a plethora of modes and a wide range of vehicles ranging from small to gigantic, the game offers a wide range of fun races and events, and is a breath of fresh air compared to traditional racing games.

Goat Simulator (Cloud, Console, PC)
